21st Ordinary General Chapter of the MSFS Held

Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh, India | February 14, 2025 - The 21st Ordinary General Chapter of the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS) was held from February 1–14, 2025, at Stella Maris, the Provincialate of the Visakhapatnam Province. Themed "I chose you, MSFS: Live your Charism" (cf. Jn 15:16), the Chapter brought together members for reflection, discussion, and discernment.

The Chapter opened with a warm welcome by Fr. Suresh Babu, the Provincial of Visakhapatnam, and his curia on the evening of January 31. The first day was set apart for spiritual preparation, with a recollection preached by Fr. Agnelo Fernandes. His reflection focused on the Chapter theme, exploring the Charism of the MSFS from three angles: What it is, why it matters, and how it is to be lived.

The Eucharistic Celebration was presided over by Fr. Abraham Vettuvelil, the outgoing Superior General, with the General Curia as concelebrants. In his homily, he invited members to reflect on their identity, mission, and purpose, reminding them of God's call to live their Charism with sacrificial love and holy indifference.

The inaugural session on February 1 began at 2:30 p.m., marked by the singing of Veni Creator Spiritus, lamp lighting, and the enthronement of the Bible and the Constitution. Archbishop Thomas Tharayil of Changanacherry delivered the keynote address, offering insights into missionary identity, evangelisation, and the challenges of faith in today's secular world.

The Chapter comprised 47 members, including 24 elected delegates, 19 ex-officio members, and 4 special invitees. The proceedings featured active participation, in-depth discussions, and juridical decisions that culminated in the official Statement and Decisions of the General Chapter 2025.

The Chapter elected Fr. Johnson Kallidukil as Superior General, Fr. Saji Puthiyakulangara as Assistant General, Frs. Thumma Mariadas, A. Christu Raj, Benedict De Souza, and A. Anthony Swamy as General Councillors, and Fr. Jose Karickal as General Bursar. The new team took office through a solemn installation and oath-taking ceremony.

The Chapter was well-organised by the Pre-capitular Commission, also serving as the Steering Committee, comprising Fr. Dola Velankanni (Secretary General), Frs. Shibu Poovathunkal, Benedict De Souza, and A. Anthony Swamy, with whole-hearted, generous support from Fr. Suresh Babu and the Stella Maris community.



Cause of the Founder Moves to Rome

Annecy, France | May 6, 2025 – The significant event of the Closing Session of the Diocesan Inquiry into the life, virtues, and holiness of Servant of God Fr. Peter Mermier, the founder of the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS), took place on May 6, 2025, at Annecy. Rev. Charles Bouvard, the Episcopal Delegate, presided over the tribunal in the presence of Mgr Yves Le Saux, Bishop of Annecy, and Rev. Alain Fournier-Bidoz, Promoter of Justice.

Also in attendance were Fr. Johnson Kallidukil, Superior General of the MSFS; Fr. Jean Yves Le Tue MSFS, Franco-Swiss Provincial; Sr. Maryline Darbellay, Assistant Superior General of the Sisters of the Cross of Chavanod; and many MSFS confreres, sisters, and guests from the diocese.

Fr. Samuel Thomas, MSFS, vice-postulator, welcomed the assembly and led the proceedings. Officials affirmed their faithful service with a solemn oath recorded by the Notary. Bishop Le

Saux emphasised the spiritual importance of the process, calling it a return to the charism and "first love" of the Congregation. Fr. Kallidukil hailed the event as a milestone in a journey begun in 1988, reaffirming the Congregation's fervent support to the cause as it enters its Roman phase. Fr. Le Tue expressed gratitude for the shared work of love and hope for recognition of Fr. Mermier's heroic life.

After validating the documents and affirming no objections, Rev. Bouvard ordered the sealing and archival of the originals, and the transmission of authenticated copies to the

Dicastery for the Causes of Saints. Fr. Thomas Kulandaisamy MSFS, the postulator, took oath to deliver the dossier faithfully to the Dicastery. The session ended with a prayer and hymn, marking a historic step toward Fr. Mermier's beatification.

Fr. Thomas Kulandaisamy, MSFS, the postulator of the diocesan phase, Fr Samuel Thomas, MSFS, the vice-postulator, and Fr Yobu Melkie Sadhek Selvaraj, MSFS, the copyist, contributed their best toward the meticulous completion of the diocesan phase.

Shepherd's Reflections: MSFS' Mission in Caltagirone

The Missionaries of St Francis de Sales (MSFS) have been actively involved in the Diocese of Caltagirone, Italy, for several years. Their missionary presence, rooted in the charism of St. Francis de Sales and Fr. Mermier, has touched lives in quiet but profound ways. In this conversation, **Monsignor Calogero Pero, OFM**, the Bishop of Caltagirone, Sicily, Italy, shared with **Fr. Arockia Jeyaraj, MSFS**, his insights on the missionary life, contributions, and challenges of the MSFS in the local Church.

How would you describe the mission and presence of the MSFS in your Diocese?

The mission of the MSFS in our Diocese can be characterised by three key qualities: availability, commitment, and adaptability. Their availability is remarkable. Many of the missionaries are very young, yet they willingly embrace a completely new experience—starting from scratch, not only in a different location but in an entirely different cultural context. Their commitment is deep. They do not perform their duties superficially but with wholehearted dedication, giving their best in everything entrusted to them. Their adaptability is especially evident in their ability to respond effectively to the needs of our people, respecting the culture and history of our communities. This shows a genuine spirit of inculturation—integrating themselves into the lives of the people they serve.

In your view, what has been the broader contribution of the MSFS to the Church and society?

They have inspired us deeply. These men, having left their homeland, culture, and comfort, bear witness to the Gospel in our midst. Their presence challenges us to ask ourselves: Are we truly ready to give our lives for the Gospel—not in theory, but in reality? Their lives echo the Lord's mandate: "Go into all the world and proclaim the Good News."

Can you share an example of how the MSFS have impacted local communities?

In many communities, the MSFS have become more than just priests—they are sons, brothers, friends, and even father figures. Their presence has helped people understand the Gospel not merely as something to preach to others, but as a personal call to respond: "Here I am."

What message would you like to share with the MSFS?

Let your charism shine clearly through the witness of relationships rooted in Christ. The Church observes and needs this witness today. The missionary zeal in the West has grown dormant; vocations have declined, and missionaries now often come here instead of going out. I urge the MSFS to rekindle missionary awareness among the faithful—to awaken the Church to her universal call. I thank you sincerely for your faith, service, and sacrifices. May the peace of the Risen Lord be with you always.

Doing Much with a Little: Nurturing Lives in the Mission

In the true spirit of St. Francis de Sales' timeless counsel, "Bloom where you are planted," the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS) have sown seeds of faith, service, and community life in the humble soil of Pochampalli. Since the mission's inception on July 7, 2021, under the Diocese of Dharmapuri, the MSFS Fathers of the South East India Province have been nurturing it with prayer, commitment, and vision.

What began as an empty stretch of land has been transformed into a living space of grace. The faithful, young and old, are encouraged to take part in competitions and initiatives at both diocesan and congregational levels, instilling a sense of belonging and joyful engagement.

This remarkable growth is the fruit of the collective labour of the MSFS Fathers, who serve with humility and zeal, especially Fr. S. Arockia Christu Raj, the Priest-in-charge. Insights from the Patron SELF-EMPTYING LOVE: Moving beyond Self-Interest

In a world dominated by speed, digital noise, and individualism, the teachings of St. Francis de Sales offer a profound invitation to return to what truly matters—love rooted in humility and self-gift. His vision of self-emptying love, marked by gentleness, empathy, and generosity, speaks urgently to a society distracted by superficial connections and self-promotion.

Defining Self-Emptying Love: St. Francis famously said, "The measure of love is to love without measure." This captures the essence of self-emptying love—a boundless, sacrificial love that moves beyond self-interest. In an era obsessed with likes, followers, and personal branding, his words challenge us to shift from performance to presence, from selfish gain to sincere service.

Social Media and Human Disconnection: While social media promises connection, it often breeds isolation, envy, and comparison. Curated lives online can distort self-worth and alienate us from authentic community. St. Francis reminds us: "The greatest service we can do to God is to love one another." His call to humility invites us to see beyond digital facades and nurture relationships marked by compassion, empathy, and honesty.

Technology and the Loss of Presence: Despite its advantages, technology can diminish the depth of human connection. St. Francis' insight— "We must sow the seeds of love in the hearts of others"— urges us to reclaim face-to-face interactions and genuine encounters. By setting boundaries with screens and prioritizing presence, we make space for love that listens, accompanies, and heals.

Healing Divisions through Love: In a fragmented world, self-emptying love becomes a path to reconciliation. "A heart that is empty of self is a heart that is full of God," he writes. Letting go of pride and choosing forgiveness over argument opens doors to healing within families, communities, and even within ourselves.

Union with God and Others: St. Francis teaches that love of neighbor leads us to God: "Where there is love, there is God." Every act of selfless love becomes an opportunity for divine encounter. When we serve others with sincerity, we participate in God's love and presence in the world.

Self-emptying love, as lived and taught by St. Francis de Sales, offers a powerful response to today's cultural shallowness. In choosing humility over ego, presence over distraction, and service over self, we not only renew our relationships but also deepen our communion with God. This love remains the cornerstone of true human and spiritual flourishing.



Thoughts from the Founder's Heart

Self-Emptying Love as Revealed in Mermier's Letters

The Letters of Fr. Mermier were published in 1987 by the Florimont Institute after years of meticulous research and transcription led by Fr. Adrien Duval, MSFS, the 11th Superior General. This French edition comprises over 850 typewritten pages and includes approximately 400 letters. Many were preserved by early Missionaries and are now housed in the central archives of the MSFS in Rome. Fr. Mermier began keeping drafts and copies from 1842 onwards, a practice mirrored by the Daughters of the Cross, who in 1886 published 70 of his letters in *Les Annales de famille* (Family Annals). Additional letters are stored in Annecy's diocesan archives.

A Treasure for Canonisation and Reflection

This rich collection has proven vital for the canonisation process. Fr. Duval's tireless work allowed both original manuscripts and typewritten versions to be studied and preserved systematically. A striking feature of these letters is Fr. Mermier's signature: "your humble and obedient servant"—not a formality, but a profound expression of servant leadership and humility.

Guidance to Mother Claudine: Gentle Yet Firm Love

In his letter to Mother Claudine (April 27, 1855), he responds to concerns about the Sisters' lack of virtue with compassion and realism. He reminds her that growth in holiness takes time, requiring humility, patience, and kindness: "We must be firm, but sensible and kind... if you are too harsh, the Sisters will feel caught between a hammer and an anvil."

Letters to Sr. Jeanne Belleville: Embracing Sacrifice

Writing to Sr. Jeanne Belleville (June 17, 1856), Fr. Mermier encourages her to embrace illness with Christ-like resignation: "Refuse Him nothing... say: Yes, my Jesus, as You will." In another letter (Dec 13, 1843), he acknowledges the pain of leaving family behind for religious life, affirming it as a "generous and beautiful sacrifice."

To Abbé Petitjean: The Spirit of Missionary Life

In a letter to Abbé Petitjean (Dec 5, 1844), Fr. Mermier affirms missionary simplicity and fidelity to the spirit of the Rule: "Renunciation of self... becoming all things to all people." In his letter to Abbé Cheminal (May 14, 1845), he praises the swift, obedient departure of missionaries to India, writing, "The joy they felt made them stronger than any of us."


Fr. Mermier's letters embody a personal and pastoral wisdom. His words reflect not rigid doctrine, but a tender, discerning love—self-emptying, yet uniquely shaped by the needs of each recipient. These letters continue to inspire us toward attentive and sacrificial love in our own lives.

Jointly organised by the Morning Star Institute of Theology and the BRBC Commission for Theology

and Doctrine, the event drew nearly 500 delegates, including clergy, religious, and lay faithful. Dr. George Panthanmackel MSFS delivered an insightful address highlighting Pope Francis' holistic view of marriage in the contemporary world. Archbishop Thomas D'Souza of Calcutta called on families to embody unity and fidelity, while Bishop Shyamal Bose emphasised the family's vital role in preserving moral values. Dr. Stanislaus Alla SJ explored the Pope's Thomistic grounding and pastoral openness—especially his focus on mercy, simplified annulments, and outreach to non-traditional families.

Scholarly presentations by Dr. Alex Ancheles CMF (A Biblical Perspective on Amoris Laetitia), Dr. Gigesh Thomas TOR (Tradition and Innovation: Pope Francis' Moral Teaching and Pastoral Accompaniment in Marriage), Dr. George Panthanmackel MSFS (Theological Foundations of Marriage), Dr. Adikant Nayak (Bioethics and Family Life), Dr. D. Isaac Devadoss (Marriage, LGBTQ, and Reformed Church Teachings), and Dr. Joe Thannickal SDB (Amoris Laetitia Through a Psychologist's Lens) enriched the discussion.




A New Dawn at Maria Hilf: MSFS Begins Ministry in Vilsbiburg

Vilsbiburg, Germany | Feb 23, 2025 - A new chapter began at the Maria Hilf Pilgrimage Church as Fr. Robin Xavier MSFS and Fr. Manu Joseph MSFS were officially installed during a solemn Pontifical Mass presided over by Bishop Dr. Rudolf Voderholzer of Regensburg. With 45 priests and a full congregation in attendance, the bishop read the appointment decree, designating Fr. Robin as Rector Ecclesiae and Pilgrimage Director.



Fr. Baviri Suresh Babu, MSFS, Provincial Superior,






